A STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS

UC Santa Cruz, along with 10 other universities across the U.S., participated in the 16th cohort of the American Council on Education’s (ACE) Internationalization Laboratory, a guided and collaborative strategic planning process spanning two years (2018-2020), and involving the entire campus community, including Senate faculty, staff, and students.

Working through a mentored process with ACE, UC Santa Cruz assembled a Steering Committee to comprehensively review current internationalization activities on campus. Though the conclusion of the process has been delayed by the onset of the pandemic (see pg. 5 for details), we are in the final stage of the process, synthesizing information gathered throughout AY 2019-20, working with the Senate to refine institutional goals, and formulating a strategic action plan for the future.

This plan aims to better position UC Santa Cruz to participate in the global dialogue and educate undergraduate and graduate students to meaningfully engage in an increasingly interconnected world.

What is comprehensive internationalization?


ACE defines comprehensive internationalization as “a strategic, coordinated process that seeks to align and integrate policies, programs, and initiatives to position colleges and universities as more globally oriented and internationally connected institutions.”

At UC Santa Cruz, guided by our Principles of Community to “promote an environment that values and supports every person in an atmosphere of civility, honesty, cooperation, professionalism, and fairness,” we empower students and faculty to engage with the global community, respect different world views, and work confidently in diverse teams to solve 21st-century challenges.

To this end, Global Engagement will continue to expand global learning and research opportunities for our students and faculty, integrate international students and scholars into our campus community, and develop partnerships with institutions around the world to enhance cooperation in teaching, research, and service.

Claudio Campagna



Claudio Campagna is an international scholar from the Wildlife Conservation Society in Argentina with a long history at UC Santa Cruz. He works as an adjunct professor and associate researcher for the Institute of Marine Sciences and Ecology & Evolutionary Biology Department. His current focus, The Language of Conservation Project, co-headed with Dr. Daniel Guevara, Chair and Associate Professor of the Department of Philosophy at UC Santa Cruz, began in 2008.

The Language of Conservation is an interdisciplinary initiative that seeks a radical change in the way we talk and think about the value of life in all its diverse, natural forms. The issue the initiative faces is that the language used in the current conservation landscape does not capture the detriment of extinction — Campagna believes that the most important problem humanity faces is the conservation of the diversity of life from its destructive capacities.

Campagna’s philosophical interest in conservation biology began after realizing that interdisciplinary studies were needed in order to promote new values for the conservation of living things.

“The future is interdisciplinary and focuses on the breaking of frontiers,” Campagna said. “Boundaries are placed by the intellectual problems we need to solve, and humanity has to be wise to break all barriers that make those boundaries stronger.”

That philosophical interest led to the project’s most significant accomplishment.

“Language of naturalists had a deep understanding of species and representatives. The language provides a logic that induces values to help understand what the primary needs of those forms of life are,” Campagna said.

The environment UC Santa Cruz provides has been fundamental to Campagna’s life as well as research. He is also grateful for the work done at ISSS as they have assisted him in important personal and professional matters.

“[UC Santa Cruz] helped me develop a welcoming attitude towards intellectual challenges, encouraged creativity and a sense of trust in the capacity of the mind to overcome the unknown,” Campagna said. “[ISSS] has made it possible to work at UC Santa Cruz. They advised me about what to do and what not to and they have made sure that my time here has passed without worries unrelated to my work.”

“We believe that language is critical to understanding the wrongs of pushing a form of life to extinction, we refer to the logical structure of language, not just the terminology.”









Regional Areas of Origin








Students Abroad by Region






Participation by Division




Participation by Class Level

WHO AM I ABROAD?

Studying abroad had been a dream of mine since my first year. I didn't know how I was going to do it or when I was going to do it but I was determined to make it work. Throughout my undergraduate career, I always made excuses for why it wasn't a good time to apply, either because of my two jobs or because of money or my other responsibilities. I kept putting off my search for studying abroad until winter 2019 of my junior year when I decided to study abroad the following summer in Brazil.

As a student from a first-generation, low-income single-parent household, I've faced multiple obstacles throughout my college career.

Because of this I continuously doubted myself that things wouldn't work out for me.

I kept reminding myself time and time again that I had nothing to lose and I could find help for my expenses.

After submitting four different scholarship applications, I was awarded three: the Gilman Scholarship, the Promise Award, and the Foreign Language Education Abroad Fund

I was excited that I was that much closer to going to Brazil. I was proud of myself for pushing my doubts aside and thankful that others believed in me and that I was capable of achieving this.

Once it was time for me to depart, I was excited to be going to a new country but nervous because it was the first time traveling internationally by myself to a place where I knew no one. When I arrived, I was greeted by wonderful, welcoming people. My host made me feel at home and our program staff made us feel like a family. Studying abroad in Brazil was an experience I will never forget. I made new friends from other countries and learned about Brazilian culture, politics, and everyday life while experiencing everything firsthand.

Studying abroad was one of the best decisions I've made throughout my undergraduate career because I came back with new friendships, perspectives, knowledge, and passion for learning and getting outside of my comfort zone.

“With the support of my study abroad advisor, Ashley, I pushed myself to complete my application and meet the deadlines. She informed me about several scholarships and encouraged me to apply.”



A PARTNERSHIP AND ACTIVITIES DATABASE FOR UC SANTA CRUZ

GlobalConnect

Global Engagement launched an online database platform called GlobalConnect to leverage regional and international expertise and connections of UCSC faculty, which help drive campus internationalization efforts, and to manage international partnerships and activities.

What is GlobalConnect?

GlobalConnect showcases information about institutions that UCSC is engaged with across the world, through faculty research and scholarly collaborations, partnership agreements, professional networks, and other related activities. GlobalConnect consists of two parts:

- The **Publisher** - where the public searches for information in the database
- The **Portal** - where members of the campus community submit information for display in the Publisher

How can faculty submit information to GlobalConnect?

Submit or update information in GlobalConnect any time via the Portal by simply logging in with a CruzID. Specify whether

information is displayed in the Publisher, or simply shared internally with Global Engagement for planning and reporting.

How does Global Engagement use GlobalConnect?

GlobalConnect is curated by Global Engagement as a resource for the campus community, to provide a snapshot of UCSC's global footprint, foster connections among faculty, and incorporate faculty expertise into strategic planning. The division draws from GlobalConnect, for example, to guide campus leadership's international travel, devise institutional partnership strategies, develop country/region activity reports, and plan foreign delegation visits to the UCSC campus.

GLOBAL LEARNING

IN THE AGE OF ONLINE COLLABORATION

Traditional exchange partnerships allow for reciprocal mobility of students between partner universities. Students earn credit toward their degrees while studying abroad and gaining global perspectives.

In these rapidly changing times, Global Engagement is exploring additional forms of cooperation to broaden student accessibility to global learning opportunities, such as virtual internships and virtual exchange, sometimes referred to as the Collaborative Online International Learning model (COIL).

While virtual opportunities for global learning can take a variety of forms, typically, they occur at the course level. Faculty from each partner institution co-develop project-based learning activities in

their courses, positioning their students to work together to achieve learning outcomes. Joint activities are typically carried out through established online, collaborative modalities, and may also involve capstone experiences, such as short-term visits by the students to each other's institutions.

Global Classrooms, recently announced by Global Engagement, provides UCSC faculty with an opportunity to learn how to develop virtual exchange courses that allow students to engage in project-based learning with partnering institutions around the world.
